Asks doctors to adopt concept of 'Medical Social Responsibility'

New Delhi: The Vice President of India, Shri M. Venkiah Naidu has urged doctors belonging to the Indian diaspora to give back to the society by adopting their native villages and strengthening Primary Health Centres (PHCs).

Inaugurating the 13th Global Healthcare Summit organized by the American Association of Physicians of Indian Origin (AAPI) and Global Association of Physicians of Indian Origin (GAPIO), in Hyderabad today, Shri Naidu addressed the doctors to show active interest in the functioning of PHCs in their villages and help to improve them.

The Pointing out that nearly 86 per cent of all the medical visits in India are made by people living in rural areas and majority required to travel long distances, the Vice President called for paying greater attention to PHCs, which play a pivotal role in building a robust low cost healthcare system.

Expressing his concern over the rising incidence of non-communicable diseases (NCDs) which accounted for 61.08 per cent of all deaths in the country in 2016, Shri Naidu asked the medical fraternity to adopt the concept of 'Medical Social Responsibility' on the lines of CSR and appealed to doctors to visit schools once every week and counsel the children on the dangers posed by lifestyle diseases and unhealthy dietary habits.

Referring to the report of McKinsey Global Institute which has estimated that the implementation of telemedicine technology could save \$4-5 billion every year and replace half of in-person outpatient consultations in India, he wanted organizations like AAPI and GAPIO to help remote regions in India to acquire latest telemedicine equipment.

The Vice President said there is also a need to organize massive awareness drives to sensitize people on the practices to be adopted for disease prevention. "We must move away from a treatment approach to a wellness based approach, a goal that has been clearly enunciated in the National Health Policy, 2017," he added.

establish NCD clinics in both urban and rural areas, Shri Naidu urged the private sector to play a prominent role in setting up such clinics.

The Vice President pointed that inadequate public spend, low doctor-patient ratio, high share of out-of-pocket expenditure, inadequate infrastructure in rural areas were the main problems surrounding healthcare in India.

Expressing his concern over the huge shortage of qualified medical practitioners in India, Shri Naidu called for bridging the gap by opening more medical colleges and increasing the number of seats at both graduate and Post-graduate levels.

Referring to the report of McKinsey Global Institute which has estimated that the implementation of telemedicine technology could save \$4-5 billion every year and replace half of in-person outpatient consultations in India, he wanted organizations like AAPI and GAPIO to help remote regions in India to acquire latest telemedicine equipment.

E-postal ballot recorded 60.14% turnout in 2019

New Delhi: Among the many milestones recorded by Election Commission of India during the recently concluded Lok Sabha Election 2019, Electronically Transmitted Postal Ballot System (ETPBS) is one of its kind. Compared to 13,27,627 number of registered Service Electors of last General Election in 2014, a record highest number of 18,02,646 were enrolling as Service Electors in 2019 in the world's largest democratic election process. For the first time enabled through the dedicated portal e-servicevoter.eci.nic.in online registration, the service voters were sent postal ballots electronically one way to save processing time, resources and avoid human errors.

Persons working in Central Forces under Arms Act and Government officials deployed in Embassies outside the country are classified as Service Voters

and are provisioned for online enrolment. Out of the total number of Service Electors in 2019 General Elections, 10,16,245 were from Ministry of Defence; 782,595 from Ministry of Home Affairs (Central Armed Police Forces); 3539 of Ministry of External Affairs and State Police 267. In the seven phases spanning GE 2019, a total of 18,02,646 postal ballots were dispatched electronically using the flagship IT programme - ETPBS of Election Commission of India. In return 10,84,266 e-postal ballots were received indicating 60.14% turnout.

ETPBS is a fully secured system, having two security layers. Secrecy of voting is maintained through the use of OTP and PIN and no duplication of casted ETPBS is possible due to the unique QR Code in the portal https://www.etpbs.in. Through this system the service voters cast their vote on an

electronically received postal ballot, from anywhere outside their constituency, thus reducing the chances of voter fraud. The purpose of the online system was to create convenient and easy-to-use online system for Defense Personnel to be covered Service Voters. Service Voter turnout in 2019 was only 4%.

With the motto of "no voter to be left behind", Election Commission of India's ETPBS has empowered and ensured all eligible service electors with their constitutional power to vote while performing their duty for the nation. Service Electors in 2019 in the world's largest democratic election process. For the first time enabled through the dedicated portal https://www.servicevoter.eci.nic.in online registration, the service voters were sent postal ballots electronically one way to save processing time, resources and avoid human errors.

There is no proposal to cut Fertilizers Subsidies

New Delhi: Urea is being produced in the refineries and the statutory notified Maximum Retail Price (MRP) of 45 kg bag of Urea is 243 per bag (exclusive of charges towards neem coating and taxes as applicable) and the MRP of 50 kg bag of Urea is Rs. 268 per bag (exclusive of charges towards neem coating and taxes as applicable). The difference between the delivered cost of

fertilizers at farm gate and the net cost of the fertilizers to the urea units is given as subsidy to the urea manufacturer/importer by the Government of India.

As far as Phosphate and Potassic (PKA) fertilizers are concerned, Government is implementing Nutrient Based Subsidy (NBS) Scheme w.e.f. 1.4.2010. Under the scheme, a fixed amount of subsidy decided on annual basis.
